Weekend double treat for Hush fans

Hush, who launched their three-month national tour before huge crowds in Tasmania last week, will have two Sydney shows this weekend.

The popular young band will perform at the Bradly Liberator tomorrow night and the Cape Town on Sunday.

Then, after a break,

in country areas of New South Wales and parts of Australia, including Victoria, Northern Tasmania, will play at Sydney's Capitol Theatre on June 6.

Hush's "Glad All Over" single is currently in the Australian Top 100 and, if it continues to climb, the band will

take a temporary break from their local tour to do its final promotional work.

The singles release is part of a massive marketing package which Hush are carrying during the biggest campaign ever devised in Australia.

Superstar! Hush a superstar group? You may well ask. They may become one and if so it will be a feather in the cap for Newswise because the lead singer is Keith Lamb, a group from Australia. Keith Lamb, who was born in Norwich, has emigrated to Australia as a boy. The flip, "Spillie," is less stylized heavier rock which indicates that Hush could have done the DC5 reworking bit on the A side if they had wanted. Good job they didn't. Four-star rating.
